A God of Love

"And so we know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love." (1 John 4:16)

Back in 2003 Thrivent Financial produced a movie about Martin Luther. I don't know how many of you saw this movie, but one scene that stuck out to me is when a young child took his own life. The father asked Luther what God had to say about suicide. The caretaker of the church's graveyard refused to bury the child, but Luther did. He told the parents that God is mercy. Although, according to my knowledge and education, we have no example of Luther doing this, but this scene illustrates a point about the Reformation.

The very next scene Luther is preaching to his congregation and he says, "Terrible, unforgiving, that's how I saw God, punishing us in this life, sentencing sinners to burn in hell for all eternity. But I was wrong. Those who see God as angry do not see him rightly. If we believe that Christ is our Savior then we have a God of love, and to see God in faith is to look upon his friendly heart."

Luther spent the first thirty years of his life viewing God as being angry against him because he was a sinner. If we lived our lives that way we would view God as being hateful since he demands us to follow his law perfectly even though we can't. If God only treated us according to his law, then the only conclusion we can have is that God is not a God of love.

We shouldn't have a God of love, but we do! That's what this passage from 1 John emphasizes. Think of how we see God's love in our lives. We see God's love in simple things. Perhaps randomly out of nowhere something good happens to you and you don't know exactly why: that's an example of God's love. We see God's love in significant ways. Maybe you have had a loved one who is sick and dying and the doctors tell you that they have done everything for that loved one, and it seems like your loved one will pass away. But then your loved one lives: that's an example of God's love. We see God's love in personal ways. There are times when we offer our prayers to God and he answers our prayers exactly as we have asked: that's an example of God's love. We see God's love. We see God's love in the ultimate way. He sent his Son to save us from our sins: this is God's love.

And as we view God through faith we no longer view God according to our thoughts but according to his good and loving will. Through faith we no longer see a God of hatred but a God of love who no longer sees us as sinners but as his perfect children. This is the main message of the Reformation and let us rejoice that we have a God of love.

How can I be happy when people attack me for doing the right thing?

"Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness."

Matthew 5:10

Parents who won't let their teenage daughter go to R-rated movies might not win a "Favorite Parent" contest with their daughter's classmates because they seem too restrictive. They are only trying to look out for the welfare of their daughter. A factory employee working at a fast pace may get a talking to by others on the job. He might hear, "Stop working so hard. You're making the rest of us look bad." He's only trying to be a faithful worker and do his best. A freshman in high school has spent hours studying for the science test. Some of his classmates know that he'll do well on the test, so they ask him to let them copy his answers. He tells them "No." Those same classmates begin to make life miserable for him. He was only trying to be honest and not help others cheat.

Can any of these people be happy that they did the right thing? Is there any happiness in being looked at differently or having a reputation ruined? Wouldn't it be better to do things that won't cause conflict? It may surprise you, but Jesus says that people can have joy in their hearts for doing the right thing. "Blessed (happy) are those who are persecuted because of righteousness (doing the right thing), for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Jesus knew that it isn't always easy to do the right thing. But with these words Jesus is talking to people who know him. They know who he is. They know he is God who came as the Savior to forgive their failures and guarantee a place in heaven for them.

People who know and trust in Jesus want to do the right thing. They want to be parents who look out for their child's well-being. They want to use their talents and abilities as best they can. They want to live honestly. They do this even if they are attacked for doing the right thing. In the way they live, they want to thank Jesus because he's promised them the gift of heaven.

Be happy knowing that there is someplace better waiting for you. It's a place where there is no backbiting or peer pressure. It's the place called heaven. Jesus promised it.

- One-time called worker bonus
- Install a new sign running perpendicular to the building
- New lighting in the narthex
